

**LINDSAY SANDES KIN****GENERATIONS 9 to 4.**

The Lindsay Sandes believe that they are descended from **John** (A 0603) of Moyvane, but have yet to establish a link through Generations 5 and 4. The surname was for a time spelt Sands, initially by the unknown father of Thomas (0301), who is said to have been spurned by his family for marrying unsuitably, but later reverted to Sandes.

**GENERATION 3.**

Thomas (0301) is believed to have been born in Belfast, but settled in Dublin. He married twice. By his first marriage, to Susan Moore, he had two sons and a daughter. By his second, to Edith Ann, daughter of Robert Ratcliffe Lindsay by Annie O'Neil of Shane's Castle, Co. Antrim, he had four sons and a daughter. He was living in 1916.

**GENERATION 2.****Issue of Thomas Sands (0301) and Susan Moore:**

Herbert (0201) was born on 24 February 1867 at Mullaghlass, Co. Armagh. He was a very brilliant boy, but died young.

Anne (0202) was the first woman to be awarded an Irish BA. She also died young.

Howard (0203) became a doctor of medicine in Cheltenham. He married Carrie, by whom he had a daughter.

**Issue of Thomas Sands (0301) and Edith Ann Lindsay:**

James Lindsay (0204) was born in Dublin on 14 February 1874, and was educated at High School and Wesley College, Dublin. He went on to Keyham Royal Naval Engineering College, Devonport, and went to sea in HMS Eclipse as an Assistant Engineer in 1897. In 1902 he was promoted Engineer Lieutenant. For two years he was on the staff of the Parliamentary Boiler Committee, in charge of experimental Yarrow boilers. He was promoted Lt-Cdr (E) in 1910 and stationed in Liverpool for two years as Admiralty Overseer, during which time he is believed to have invented a torpedo warhead and improvements to ships' engines which were adopted in all HM ships. On promotion to Commander (E) in 1914 he was appointed to HMS Southampton and became Fleet Engineer of a light cruiser squadron actively engaged in the North Sea. His services at the Battle of Dogger Bank in 1915 were mentioned in despatches. From late 1916 to mid 1919 he served in the battleship HMS Monarch in the Grand Fleet, after which he was posted to Hong Kong as Chief Engineer of HM Dockyard at Wei Hei Wei, North China. On return to England in 1924 he went on half pay and was retired. He later became Engineer and Manager to Messrs Millers & Corys at St. Vincent, Cape Verde Islands. In 1928 he became a MIMechE. He then became Vice Consul and HM Consul, St. Vincent, serving for over ten years and throughout World War II, and was also Overseer for Lloyds in the islands. He retired as a Captain MBE RN.

James is said to have spelt his surname Sands because of a clerical error when he joined the Royal Navy, which calls in question the information at the start of this Annex. On 4 June 1907, in Bristol, he married Margaret Elizabeth (Daisy) Furber, by whom he had a son and a daughter. He died at Lisbon in 1946.

Robert Ratcliffe (0205) practised as a barrister in Dublin and Capetown, South Africa. He wrote works on the law. At the age of about 63 he married Peggy, by whom he had a son and a daughter. He is said to have reverted to spelling his surname Sandes on meeting another man of that name in South Africa.

Thomas Lindsay (0206) was born in 1877. He became a chartered engineer and FRCS and was awarded the OBE. He lived in Capetown, and married Bell, daughter of A Metcalf, a solicitor of Cradock, South Africa. By her he had two sons and a daughter. He died in 1955.

Edith (0207) was married to Reginald Tennison, by whom she had two daughters, Doreen and Molly (Owen). Doreen was living in Surrey in 2003, and Molly at Lake Tahoe, California. I corresponded with her at length, and have her autobiography 'Without my Cloak' but it is now several years since I have heard from her, and she must have died.

John Drummond (0208) was born in 1884. He was a doctor in the Indian Medical Service, an FRCP, and Professor of Medicine at Calcutta University. He also served as a Lt-Col in the Indian Army Medical Corps and was on the staff of the Viceroy of India, accompanying Edward Prince of Wales during his tour of the sub-continent in the 1920s. He married Gwenta Lockhart, by whom he had a daughter, but the marriage was dissolved. He

then married Rosamund or Rosalind Corfield, who outlived him. He died on 6 January 1977 in London.

Patrick Thomas Lindsay (0102) was born on 10 March 1914. Following a visit to his grandparents in Ireland in 1916, he developed bacterial meningitis, causing permanent brain damage, and lived in sheltered housing in Bedford.

Edith Margaret (Peggy) Lindsay (0103) was born on 12 December 1920. On 23 December 1941 she was married to Arthur Richard Turner of Newmarket, Suffolk, by whom she had two sons and a daughter. John Richard Lindsay MBE RN (retd) was born on 6 January 1945 and married Judith Roberts (nee Marryatt) by whom he has a child, Southerly Roberts. Nicholas James Lindsay MA was born on 5 March 1947 and married twice: by Judith Linnell BA he had a son and a daughter, and by Jane Shoaf of Smith College, USA, he has a son. Susan Elisabeth Margaret (Suki) BSc was born on 10 September 1950 and was married to Martin Sinclair BA RAF by whom she has two sons.

Issue of Robert Ratcliffe Sandes (0205) and Peggy:

Dennis (0104) is a minister of the Church at Kells, Co Kilkenny, Ireland.

Daphne (0105) died.

Issue of Thomas Lindsay Sandes (0206) and Bell Metcalf:

Denis (0106) took an MB at Cambridge University, and became a Surgeon Lieutenant RNVR. He went down in HMS Warwick off Cornwall on 12 February 1944.

Terence (Ben) Lindsay (0107) grew up in South Africa. In 1941 he married Diana, daughter of Major-General Wildman-Lushington RM, by whom he had two sons. He took a BA at Cambridge and served throughout World War II in the RAF, becoming a Wing

Commander and winning the DFC. After the war he farmed near Middleburg, South Africa until 1961, when he returned to England. In 1964 he settled at Ballyduff, Co. Waterford, Ireland, and has died.

Sylvia Patricia (0108) was married to Hugh White in 1948. They were both lawyers and lived at Knysna, South Africa. Sylvia was said to look very like my mother when she married.

Issue of John Drummond Sandes (0208) and Gwenta Lockhart:

Patricia (0109) was married three times. Her first husband was a POW of the Japanese and worked on the Burma Road (?). Her second husband was Colonel Tony Simpson, with whom she lived at Cascais, Portugal. Her third husband was Van Regensburg Versluys, an international lawyer. She now lives alone in Surrey.
